#### SAFEGUARDING MATTERS...

Year 6 Safeguarding Soldiers have been working together to see how we can improve certain things in our school. Keeping everyone safe at all times is very important. We have noticed that there are some things that you can help to do to keep us safe.

At the end of the day children in Year 2 and 3 leave school from the main entrance. This means that the doorway is really busy at this time. It is very important that our teachers can concentrate on looking for our parents and making sure we get to them safely. This is sometimes made really tricky because parents need to come into the school office. If you do need to come into the office at this time, please could we ask that you wait until all the children have been handed over to their parents? It would be good if you could not come into school between 3.20 and 3.30p.m. It also means that Mrs Peart and Mrs Tague and other teachers can do their normal safety checks on people coming into school.

Please can you keep the area by the school gate clear so that bus children have somewhere to wait – it means that teachers know which children are getting on the bus.

Parking outside school is really dangerous. Please can you keep us safe by making sure that you do not park on the zig-zags or yellow lines. Local residents have asked that you do not block their driveways or use them as turning points please, particularly at the lane end and the vicarage.

We have also been looking at climate change and our carbon footprint and seeing what we can do to help. We have noticed that parents keep their engines running whilst waiting outside school, especially on an afternoon when they come and park up early. We know you do this to keep warm while you are waiting but have you ever thought about the harmful exhaust fumes that your car is omitting? Do you realise that we are breathing in these fumes!!!!
