## **Headteacher's Message**

We have had a fabulous half term in school. The beginning was a bit shaky with the number of COVID cases but, fingers-crossed, we are beginning to be able to enjoy more activities together as a whole school. We have had some amazing things going on in school and Year 6 have done an excellent job as our roving reporters to bring you the news!!!

Thank you for returning the **questionnaires**. We had a 77% return which is amazing. We have taken on board the comments that you made and hopefully over the coming term we will be able to put some of your suggestions in place.

A lot were really linked to a return to normality with more opportunities for parents to share in your child's learning through parents' evenings and open days.

In the meantime, to bridge that gap, your child will bring home tonight a 'Reflection on Learning' sheet which outlines what your child has done this half term and their response to their learning.

We have also included the 'Curriculum Map' for your child's Year group which outlines what will be taught across the year. Also included are the End of Year expectations for your child's year group in Reading Writing and Maths.

You also asked about a **wider provision of after school clubs and wrap around care.** We are trying to provide clubs as best as we can, but often we are running these at a loss due to low up-take. This is sometimes because children attend activities in the community. I will look into the possibility of running an after-school club in the same way that Breakfast Club runs after half term.

More **homework for our older children** was also requested. We have purchased some self study books that we will distribute to Years 4, 5 & 6 after half term. Information as to how to use these will be sent out with them after the holidays.

We appreciate that the traffic around the start and end of the school day is bad. However, the school day was always 8.55a.m. start. The **offer of 8.30a.m. drop off** during the pandemic was a temporary measure and a gesture of goodwill from staff to support working parents when we were not able to offer Breakfast Club. Breakfast Club is now operating as normal from 8a.m. I have been in touch with the Highways Department at DCC to make them aware of the on-going problem with traffic. I have also contacted the police about parking in restricted zones which impacts on the flow of traffic.

## Wonderful World Book Day

World Book Day will take place on *Friday 4th March*, which will make it the 25<sup>th</sup> anniversary. The message for everybody is 'you are a reader' and knowing that you can read for pleasure.

Here at Escomb, we thought about when do you read for pleasure, and most people agreed that the answer was at bed-time. This year our theme will be bedtime stories- so that means that you can wear your favourite pyjamas (or onesies) to school! Although, you must come to school in suitable footwear. You are allowed to bring a stuffed teddy but it has to be an appropriate size to bring to school, and most importantly...your favourite book!

In the afternoon, children will be served hot chocolate or a cup of juice and a yummy biscuit to enjoy- whilst listening to their stories. During the day the children will also be doing a mixture of reading activities. Thank you
